We are continuing our work with key partners in Kananaskis and Banff to support flood restoration and connectivity of trail networks throughout the Bow Valley. We recently participated in the Trails Fest tradeshow to foster closer relationships with like-minded organizations to further these goals. On June 2<sup>nd</sup> the new Canmore Trails Plan will be up for approval in Council.

## Lake Louise Ski Area Site Guidelines - Online for Public Comment



The draft Lake Louise Ski Area Site Guidelines for Development and Use have been released by Parks Canada, developed in collaboration with the Lake Louise Ski Area. The outcomes associated will positively affect the future of wildlife conservation in the region, as well as an improved skiing and snowboarding experience, outstanding educational gains, and an enhanced year-round visitor offering in Banff NP, with substantial economic benefit for Alberta & Canada. Parks Canada will be hosting Open Houses from 6-8:30 pm on June 10 (Calgary), June 11 (Banff) and June 12 (Lake Louise). The Plan is open to public feedback until June 21st.

## Effects of fish on Harlequin Duck breeding behaviour



New science may explain the decline of the Harlequin Duck populations in Western Canada, thanks to a PhD candidate at Simon Fraser University. Emily McAuley is developing a scientific study on the effect of introduced fish on harlequin duck breeding behaviour and success. Harlequin ducks have been experiencing a slow but steady decline for decades with the Eastern Harlequin population now listed as Special Concern with COSEWIC and the western harlequin duck classified as Sensitive in the current General Status of Alberta Wild Species report.

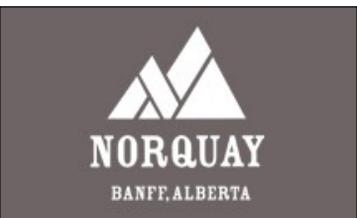
## Paragliders launch inaugural flight in Jasper National Park



Until recently, a paraglider had never before launched or landed in a Canadian national park. It was nine years ago that the Hang Gliding and Paragliding Association of Canada (HPAC) first approached Parks Canada, asking that it consider paragliding and hang gliding in National Parks as new recreational activities. Parks approved the guidelines and has started a two-year pilot project for paragliding and hang gliding in Jasper NP. Within the guidelines, Parks has provided direction as to where pilots are prohibited from taking off, flying and landing, including environmentally sensitive sites.

## #AlignedWithAMPPE Member Feature – Banff Mount Norquay



AMPPE is proud to align with Banff Mount Norquay, home to Banff National Park's only Via Ferrata. Italian for 'Iron Road,' climbers are guided by ACMG certified guides as they climb a series of cables, fixed anchors, ladders and cross a 30-m suspension bridge. New this summer is the 'Mountaineer' route, which traverses an alpine ridge to the East Summit (2450 m) of Mt. Norquay. Installed in May 2015, this route includes an additional new 3-wire suspension bridge over an impressive chasm and beautiful 360-degree views. Also on offer are the popular 'Explorer' and 'Ridgewalker' Routes.
